- **PSP: Post Secondary Program**

Similarities

- 18-22
- Legally Blind
- Expanded Core Curriculum focus
- Preparation for Adult Life
- Community Experiences/ Exploration
- Live on TSBVI campus
- 24 hour Security
- Programming based on needs and future goals

Primary Difference

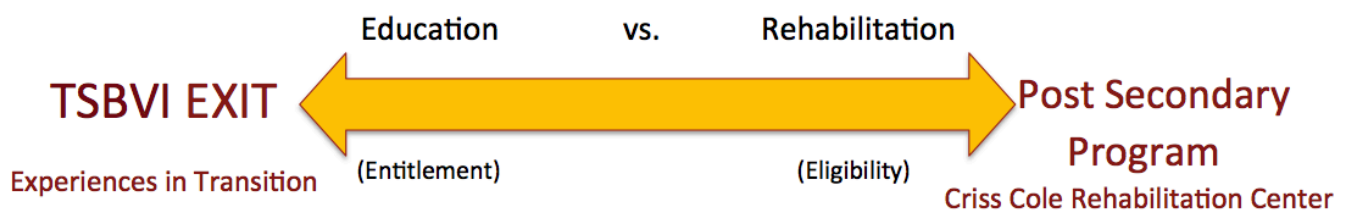


Figure 1: Large two-sided golden arrow around TSBVI EXIT (Experiences in Transition) on left versus Post Secondary Program at Criss Cole Rehabilitation Center on the right. Above the arrow are Education & Entitlement on the left and Rehabilitation and Eligibility on the right.

Primary Difference

- **Exit**
 - Education
 - Entitlement through IDEA
- **PSP**
 - Rehabilitation
 - Eligibility through ADA

Eligibility Criteria

- **EXIT**
 - Enrolled in home school district
 - Credit requirements met for graduation
 - State testing complete
 - Continuum of students/ support needs
- **PSP**
 - High School Diploma or GED attained
 - Able to manage personal and health needs independently
 - Planning to attend college and/or work
 - Planning to live independently or with minimal support

Referral Process

- **EXIT**
 - Referred by school district
 - Application requires referring district to identify reasons for referral
 - Eventual return to district for transition services is considered
- **PSP**
 - Transition Counselor refers consumer to Criss Cole Rehabilitation Center (CCRC)
 - CCRC staff refer to the Post Secondary Program (PSP) those that are a good fit and meet the criteria

Cost

- **EXIT**
 - Free Appropriate Public Education (FAPE)
 - Student trust funds
- **PSP**
 - Students are required to pay for their daily living needs (i.e. food and household products) typically through SSI or SSDI

Living Arrangements/Supervision

- **EXIT**
 - Dorms
 - 24 hour supervision
 - Supervision levels determined by instructional team
 - FUSA
 - Health Center

- **PSP**
 - Four student apartments on TSBVI campus (No roommates)
 - Supervision (no overnight supervision)
 - No Health Center

Service Delivery

- **EXIT**
 - IEP driven (IEP created collaboratively with LEA)
 - Parent Involvement
 - Self Contained groups (Teacher & TA)
 - Residential instruction supports IEP
 - Career Education Programming
 - Related Services

- **PSP**
 - Individual student goal driven
 - Minimal parent involvement
 - Classes at CCRC (how classes are determined)
 - Individualized instruction in student apartments provided by PSP director and assistant
 - 100 hour of volunteer work required
 - Counseling available through DBS Transition Counselor

Service Delivery Continued

- **EXIT**
 - Challenges in planning for Adult Transition from a distance
 - Benefit of returning to home community while still eligible for SPED services
 - Transition/ Collaboration Meetings
- **PSP**
 - Participants, PSP staff, and CCRC staff develop transition plans through goal setting
 - Program Review Trainings

Transition Planning

- **EXIT**
 - Follow Austin ISD school calendar year
 - ARD Committee makes decisions at annual ARD (return to TSBVI, return to district for Transition Services, graduation)
- **PSP**
 - Length of stay varies according to needs and goals
 - Average length of stay: 6-10 months

Saturday: Some community outings including housing research, thrifty shopping, etc.

Sunday: Some recreational outings and planning for the week.

Part of PSP time is goal setting for the week which then becomes scheduled activities. ACC time becomes part of weekly schedule for some participants.

Schedules change as CCRC classes may end every 8 weeks, which leaves more time to complete the required 100 hours of volunteer work experience
